He lived in Satigny (by Geneva) and then later at Caux (above Montreux) where he wrote his book *Prelude to the New Man*. Although the basic action of Martin was through using directly the music as an awakening of consciousness, his book presents a training, starting with the known psychological principles, basic exercises dealing with desires, thoughts and sensations, continuing with ontological principles, centers of awareness, and ending with the unfolding of perceptions, radiations, and two basic exercises: the crystal exercise and down-and-away exercises, in which the consciousness is freed so that another reality might transappear of its own authority. Martin continued to develop his classes in what he called calisthenics—the calisthenics of consciousness. The calisthenics present here are the outer parts of the classes given by Martin; what is unfortunately missing is the part when music was used to create a direct change in the consciousness in the participants. The reader, after reading some of the material, might want to know and understand who Martin was intimately.
